et me share with you some highlights of 2008 since the last Annual General Meeting of the Inner City Pastoral Ministry March 27, 2008, hosted by Christ Church Anglican.

Highlights began at the AGM meeting with the theological reflection of the Rev. Kathy Hogman, President of the Edmonton United Church Presbytery. Kathy spoke of the plight of Aboriginal people in regards to Residential Schools. Kathy shared some of her experience of dealing with persons affected by this schooling

while serving the United Church in Port Alberni, BC. Kathy shared that "resurrection" in the context of healing and reconciliation is not a theological construct but a living action of God's spirit bringing wholeness to harmed individuals and a return to right relations within the community.

Sunday Lunch Ministry

Sunday by Sunday, 52 weeks of the year, the ICPM Worship and Sunday Lunch Ministry continues within the Emmanuel Community Church. Churches and faith community

members continue to offer their resources and service to enable this ministry amongst the inner city community; food for the body, food for the spirit. Thank you for your cheerful and willing support.

We already feel very much at home at the Bissell Centre as we share with Bissell staff and Aboriginal Elders the work and ministry within the inner city community and amongst the homeless.

Anniversary Celebrations

30th Anniversary celebrations in 2008 need highlighting! Celebrations began at the AGM with prayer and worship; celebration continued through the year. Fall events included a special service of celebration that included a sit down lunch and a clown with special skills at twisting balloons. Later in the year we held a "30th Anniversary Tea" for Bissell and agency staff. Thank you Sister Marion and the 30th Anniversary Committee for working out all the celebration details!

Educational Conferences Planned

During 2008 preliminary planning set the platform for two educational conferences planned for 2009, entitled: Gathering 2 "Kanata / Canada" hosted by the United Church, April 23, 24, and a "Homelessness Conference" - Key note Speaker - Dr. Murray Mac Adam, Social Justice Consultant, Diocese of Toronto, October 15-17. The "Gathering" is designed to engage spiritual and community leaders of Aboriginal and "Canada" heritage in

what is being described as "a return to right relations."

The "Homelessness Conference" is designed to educate faith leaders regarding the continuing concerns regarding homelessness and to explore ways that enable the faith community to advocate for change. I am excited about these conferences as ICPM partners with Aboriginal leadership and the faith community to bring about these events!

Appeal for Support

In 2008, three appeals were made to supporting churches, church organizations and individuals.

The first was the request for financial support to purchase ICPM 30th Anniversary crosses. Through contributing churches and individuals we were able to purchases 1500 crosses of which over 1200 were given out within the community in 2008. Thank you!

Christmas Sack Appeal

Second, our annual Emmanuel Christmas Sack appeal, received over 1000 lovely gifts sacks for distribution within the inner city. Mitts, scarves, toques, toiletries and seasonal treats filled the sacks to overflowing. Sue, a new ICPM Board member, from Mt. Olivet, Lutheran, eased greatly the workload involved in the "2008 Christmas Sack Campaign" by taking on the job of Christmas Sack Coordinator. Thank you Sue! The Christmas Sacks were distributed to the community during our Christmas services, through the various agencies we visit and continue to be distributed to the many who visit us in the office.

Thirdly, financial contributions to ICPM in response to our newsletter, E-file news, and our annual Christmas appeal were heartening. Your donations, financial or in kind, are essential in support of the ICPM "ministry of presence" amongst the people suffering homelessness and poverty within the inner city of Edmonton. Thank you!

The ICPM continues into 2009 as "an interdenominational Christian ministry of presence. In partnership with community, and guided by the Spirit of God, we walk with the people of the Inner City of Edmonton." The pastoral team builds solid pastoral relations with the people of the inner city. We visit and minister amongst the people of the inner city through our presence in agencies, drop ins, shelters, transition houses, Remand Centres, Federal Prisons, the city's hospitals, on the streets and in the home. We thank you for your prayerful support for the Ministry Team and the ICPM Board that enables this ministry in the coming year! Thank you!

Sunday Lunch Program

Aving taken up the position of Sunday Lunch Program
Coordinator, I must say that 2008
has been a very interesting year,
somewhat challenging at times, but
overall a great experience.

Some statistics regarding the lunches served at the ICPM Sunday Lunch at the Bissell Centre this past year:

• Ninety one (91) different churches have participated this past year and we have ninety three (93) booked already for 2009.

- Of these churches, there are twenty (20) Anglican, eighteen (18)
 Lutheran, ten (10) Roman Catholic and twenty five (25)
 United Churches. Also included in the total, one (1) Mennonite, one (1) Christian Reform, one (1)
 Baptist congregation and two (2)
 Jewish / Arab Faith Communities who participate during the Christmas Season.
- Twelve of the churches provide and serve the lunch by themselves, the other churches teamed together, usually two churches sharing in the lunch ministry most Sundays.
- We had an educational session for the Sunday Lunch contact people, church volunteers, along with

- outreach and social justice committee representatives. The yearly event is called "After the Lunch is Over." Held at the Bissell Centre on Saturday October 4, 2008, 62 people attended.
- Shared feelings, thoughts, experiences and input from the congregations and the ICPM volunteers that are there for pre set up every Sunday, enabled us to determine how things could be improved and how to better share information.
- We even had two people from the community share their thoughts and experiences with us. Hearing of the experience of people who live in the community and frequent the lunch program was very enlightening, as most of us come to the inner city only occasionally and are not there through the week.
